ADDITIONAL NAMES OF THOSE WHO PARTICIPATED IN THE BATTLE OF SAN JACINTO.

[In our ALMANAC for 1859, we published the complete official report of all the rank and file in the battle of San Jacinto. We have, however, understood from many that this report omitted many who did good service in that memorable campaign, for the reason that they had been detailed on various duties, and happened not to be present when the roll was made out after the battle. We subjoin the following extracts of letters some time since received, in order to do full justice to all.]

HALIFAX COUNTY, N. C., October 1, 1859.

GENTLEMEN: I have been furnished recently with a number of your ALMANAC for the present year, which far exceeds any thing of the kind I have ever seen. In looking over its pages, however, I see stated what I have seen before, namely, an official report of the rank and file of men and officers that took part in the battle of San Jacinto, which, I must beg leave to state, is not exactly correct, for I see omitted the names of several brave and meritorious men: Nicholas M. Bain, who took Colonel Almonte prisoner; Turner Barnes, Joseph Weeks, Doctor Gasley, etc. I had the names of many that I do not see named, who fought by my side, and, least of all, my own, and would never have noticed the report only to correct in part the statements that have been so often made as official.

I went to Texas in February, 1835, and left in the spring of 1859; and while there, I am sure that I suffered every privation but death: while in the army at the battle of Concepcion wounded, and at the Grass Fight before San Antonio again wounded; and was again in the siege the whole time, and at the battle of San Jacinto; afterward in the ranging service against the Indians, and was the first aide-camp to General Erbeson.

If nothing happens, I expect to be in your city this winter; and if so, I will try and see you in person, and can give some further information from the best sources, as I will bring them with me.

[Extract of a letter dated Cedar P. O., Fayette county, Texas, May, 1861.]

I notice, in the last two volumes of THE TEXAS ALMANAC, that you have been making efforts to obtain a list of those who were in the army of General Houston in 1838, and were at the camp opposite Harrisburg. I send you the following names:

In Captain Chance's Company, — Chance, Jr.; in Captain Baker's Company, Lancelot Abbotts.

We learn, also, by a letter from Mr. William S. Taylor, of Montgomery county, that the name of M. W. Cartwright, who was in the battle of San Jacinto and participated in the preceding campaign, was omitted in the list of names we published in THE ALMANAC of 1860. Mr. Cartwright belonged to Captain William Ware's company, and fought with the cavalry on the evening of April 21st, 1836, and had his horse shot from under him during the battle. The omission of his name in our previously published list was owing to the fact that he was separated from his company during the battle, and joined the cavalry, and hence was not reported by Captain Ware; and, not being enrolled in the cavalry company, he was not reported as belonging to it. But Mr. Taylor bears witness to the fact that he was in the battle, and performed good service throughout that campaign. He was also in the campaign of 1835, under Colonel S. P. Austin, and was in the battle of Concepcion, below San Antonio. Mr. Taylor informs us that Mr. Cartwright is now a citizen of Montgomery, where he has raised a large family, and is a worthy citizen.
